National Open Action, Four Tied at the Top


After 3 rounds of the National Open 4-day and 3-day schedules, four players are tied at the top with perfect scores.


Only games from round 1-6 will count as the award will be made prior to round 7. To submit a game, take it to one of Melik's analysis sessions.
